

Students and teachers made important connections while visiting the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI). NCAI was founded in 1944 in response to termination and assimilation policies forced upon the tribal governments in contradiction of their treaty rights and status as sovereigns. Today, NCAI secures the rights and benefits to which American Indians are entitled and educates the public about Indian people.




